CHAPTER VIII

A HISTORY OF ALABAMA SCIENCE FAIRS

INTRODUCTION

One hundred years of experience by the American Institute of the City of New York, beginning in 1828 with an Agricultural and Industrial Fair, resulted in the launching, in 1928, of a science club-science fair program designed to stimulate interest in science in high school students throughout the United States. In 1941 the administration of this science club program was transferred to Science Service, a non-profit organization for the popularization of science. The program grew until in 1956, it numbered some 16,000 high school science clubs with 400,000 members. Thus the National Science Fair, at its inception in 1950, had Science Service's Science Clubs of America as a firm foundation on which to build. From a modest start of thirteen participating areas in ten states with a total of thirty finalists competing at Philadelphia in 1950, the National Fair had grown by 1954 to fifty participating areas involving twenty-four states.

Development of the Science Fair movement in the Southeastern states had been aided greatly by a program set up by the Museum Division of Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies to promote science fairs in thirteen southeastern states and in Puerto Rico. When Dewey E. Large became associated with Oak Ridge Institute as field representative for the science fair program, work conferences were held to acquaint teachers, industrial leaders and the lay public with science fairs. James L. Kassner led the large Alabama delegation attending one such conference, held at the University of Mississippi at Oxford in November, 1954, which provided the impetus for initiating the program in Alabama. The Executive Committee of the Alabama Academy of Science, after considering recommendations from the Oxford delegation, appointed Madison L. Marshall, of the Chem-

strand Corporation, State Coordinator of Science Fairs at its meeting on December 4, 1954. He was asked to study the possibility of holding several regional science fairs within the state under the sponsorship of the Academy and of institutions of higher education. He immediately began a concerted effort to organize several regional fairs by contacting interested people throughout the state.

Science exhibit activities, though not necessarily called science fairs, had been held in Alabama for many years. An example was the display of exhibits held at St. Bernard College in Cullman, 1945-47, promoted by Father Charles Reiner, O.S.B., and a dedicated group of science instructors. The Alabama Junior Academy had encouraged science projects, science clubs (as chapters of the Alabama Junior Academy of Science), and organized science exhibits since its founding in 1933. The State Talent Search for Gorgas Scholarships provided both extensive stimulation of science in secondary schools in Alabama and an opportunity for many young people to obtain science training in college. The advent of science fairs in the state did not duplicate, but rather complemented these activities, and provided a greater opportunity and practical impetus for all students having an interest in science to participate in an organized program on a local, regional, and national level.

During the months of December, 1954 and January, 1955, Marshall contacted educational institutions and other interested groups in various parts of the state and made the plans which led to the first three annual regional fairs held, in the Spring of 1955, by the Mobile Region (originally called the First District), the North Central Region, and the North Alabama Region. The Southeastern Region initiated its program with the first annual fair in 1956. The Northeastern Region was established in March 1959 and held its first fair in 1960. These are the five regions, now active within the state, which will be presented in more detail later.

The sudden death of Mr. Marshall, in the summer of 1956, resulted in the appointment of Arthur B. Beindorff on a temporary basis. He served as Coordinator of Regional Science Fairs until his resignation in September, 1958. The Alabama Academy of Science, under the guidance of President Herbert A. McCullough, reorganized its sponsorship of Regional Science Fairs under the office of State Coordinator. This reorganization was adopted by the Executive Committee of the Academy at its meeting on November 8, 1958 (1). Father George O. Twellmeyer, S.J., of the Chemistry Department, Spring Hill College, was elected by the Executive Committee to com-

plete Beindorff's unexpired term. He was elected to a full three year term at the annual business meeting in March 1959.

REGIONAL FAIRS

Mobile Regional Science Fair. The First District Science Fair (now the Mobile Regional Science Fair) was initiated at Vigor High School, Mobile, in March, 1955. Plans for a science project exhibition were already being formulated when Madison L. Marshall contacted several people in the Mobile Area.

Mrs. Lucille Lloyd and Mr. J. S. Attebury, Jr., were primarily responsible for the motivation of science students and teachers in organizing the first fair which took the form of a non-competitive exhibition with no formal judging and no prizes. However, Billy Cochran, Vigor High School, and Mary Kate Jernigan, Convent of Mercy, were selected to represent the region at the Sixth National Science Fair at Cleveland in May, 1955. They were accompanied to Cleveland by Mr. Attebury. Funds for the first fair and for the travel to Cleveland were raised by personal solicitation.

At the time of the first fair, the Mobile Region elected to form a student science fair organization to promote interest within the high schools. This group was composed of a delegate from each participating school. The science teacher-sponsor of each of the four elected officers automatically became the steering committee for the next fair, and worked with the fair officials in formulating plans. At the same time, senior officials for the fair organization were selected. These were: Rev. George O. Twellmeyer, Coordinator; Mrs. Lucille Lloyd, Vigor High School, Executive Secretary; Sister Mary Aloysius, R.S.M., Convent of Mercy, Chairman of Steering Committee; Miss Lillian Leonard, Baldwin County High School, Chairman of Finance; and Brother Cyr, S.C., McGill Institute, Publicity Chairman.

When Father Twellmeyer became Coordinator of the Mobile Science Fair, he saw the need for a Regional Science Fair Organization, composed of non-school personnel, who would provide for financing, judging, publicizing and many other needs which students and teachers could not provide. This organization for the Second Annual Mobile Regional Science Fair, which took place February 23-24, 1956, at Vigor High School, was composed of Mr. George N. Hardesty, of The Merchants National Bank, as Director of Finance; Miss Vivian Cannon, of the *Mobile Press-Register*, as Director of Publicity; and Miss Patricia Amos, as Corresponding Secretary. Mrs. Lucille Lloyd served as Executive Secretary. The Executive Commit-

tee for this fair was the same as for the previous fair with the exception that Sister Mary Robert of the Convent of Mercy replaced Sister Mary Aloysius, who had been transferred.

Additional features of the Third Annual Fair, held at Spring Hill College, were the cooperation of the Mobile Society of the American Medical Association, which awarded three ribbons for the best exhibits in the field of medicine, and that of the Mobile Academy of Science, which sponsored an award banquet for the winners of the fair. Surplus funds from the banquet were turned over to the fair's trust fund. Mary Elizabeth Kirk replaced Patricia Amos as Corresponding Secretary at this time. Carlton W. Winsor was appointed Director of Judging and Awards and Francis J. Kearley assumed the duties of Director of Project Advising.

The number of projects entered in the Regional Fair had increased to three hundred and forty seven in the fourth fair, held in 1958, making it evident that a limitation on the number of exhibits entered by the individual schools would be necessary. Even with a maximum based on the number of mathematics and science teachers on the faculty of the school, three hundred and seven projects were entered in the Fifth Regional Fair in 1959. At this time, Mrs. Dorothy K. Allain became Corresponding and Recording Secretary and William D. Sims, The American National Bank, was appointed to the new position of Director of Public Functions.

At the time of this Fair, the position of Chairman of Teachers Work Conference Committee was instituted. Mrs. Mary E. Ward, Semmes High School, was appointed to fill this post. This Committee arranges a semi-annual work conference which deals primarily with the improvement of teaching methods.

Three hundred and five projects were entered in the sixth regional fair of 1960. The Administrators of the fair have determined that the limitation placed on the number of projects should be such as to keep the number entered in the regional fair at approximately three hundred. At the time of this fair, the Administrative Council established a Committee on Aid to Education. The Chairman of this Committee, Francis J. Kearley, former Director of Project Advising, serves on the Administrative Council.

North Alabama Regional Science Fair. The North Alabama Regional Science Fair came into being at a meeting called by Madison L. Marshall at Decatur High School, on January 8, 1955, since an official invitation had been received from Athens College to hold a regional science fair on its campus. At the meeting, attended by a number of teachers, faculty members of Athens College, and representatives from North Alabama Industries, Arthur B. Beindorff was elected Director of the proposed fair. Barrett Shelton, owner and publisher of the *Decatur Daily*, agreed to cosponsor the fair and act as the fund-raising agent. Other officials of the fair were Daren Easter, of the John Patterson Insurance Company, Decatur, Treasurer; E. C. Unnewehr, Athens College, Chairman of Local Arrangements; and H. H. Floyd, Florence State College, Judging Chairman.

The First Annual Fair was held at Athens College, April 1-2, 1955. In spite of the lack of time for preparation in this first year, the fair was a notable success. Wayne Haskins of Sheffield High School, Sheffield, Alabama, and Joan Bryant, Butler High School, Huntsville, were awarded the grand prizes and were sent to Cleveland to compete in the National Fair. Their teacher-sponsors, Miss Mary Ella Hammond and Mrs. Ibbie Bradford, accompanied the finalists. The civic clubs of Huntsville helped finance the trip.

The Second Annual North Alabama Fair was also held at Athens College. Fair officials remained the same with the exception of Richard Young of Athens College, who acted as Director of Local Arrangements. The number of exhibits increased from the eighty in 1955 to approximately one hundred twenty-five.

The Third North Alabama Fair was held at St. Bernard College in Cullman, Alabama, April 5-6, 1957. Arrangements for the fair at the campus were supervised by the Rev. Richard Jax, appointed

Director of Local Arrangements and Father Gerald Bray, Assistant Director. Approximately one hundred seventy-five exhibits were displayed by Junior and Senior high school students. Funds were procured through an enlarged committee under the chairmanship of Barrett C. Shelton. Assisting him were Louis Eckl, editor of the *Florence Times* and the *Tri-Cities Daily*, and Reese Amis, editor of the *Huntsville Times*. The third fair was supported partially by both the Cullman County and Morgan County Medical Societies, and the latter, for the second year, sponsored a medal to the best exhibit having medical significance. For the second consecutive year, the award was won by a student of Butler High School, Huntsville.

The fourth annual fair was held at Florence State College, March 14-15, 1958. H. H. Floyd of the Chemistry Department was the Director of Local Arrangements. Approximately two hundred exhibits were displayed.

The Fifth Annual Science Fair in 1959 was held at Butler High School, Huntsville, Alabama, under the auspices of the University of Alabama Extension Division at Huntsville, Alabama. Phillip Mason, Director of Local Arrangements, was assisted by representatives of local chapters of various technical societies. The facilities of Redstone Arsenal were opened to the young scientists making the overall fair a great experience for the approximately one hundred and ninety exhibitors.

The Sixth Annual Fair was held March 11-12, at Athens College. Madison Marshall and E. C. Unnewehr, both of whom were very active in the science fair program, had died since the earlier fairs at the College. Arthur B. Beindorff had been transferred to North Carolina and Mr. Carlton D. Whitt, an instructor in chemistry at Athens College, served as the Regional Coordinator. After the fair, Mrs. Ibbie K. Bradford, of Florence State College, became the first Regional Counselor of the Junior Academy. David Wilson, a finalist, was awarded second place in the Physical Science Division at the National Fair in Indianapolis and was one of five participants chosen to take their exhibits to the Industries Fair in West Berlin, Germany, September, 1960. The total number of exhibits at Athens College this year was two hundred forty, representing the largest number entered in any of the six fairs of this region. J. D. Clanton of Athens High School served as one of the statewide chaperons to the National Fair.

North Central Alabama Regional Science Fair: Responsibility for organizing a regional science fair in North Central Alabama was accepted by a committee on December 11, 1954, with Emmett B. Carmichael of the University Medical Center in Birmingham as chairman. Other members were Harold E. Wilcox of Birmingham-Southern College and Herbert A. McCullough of Howard College. In an organizational meeting on February 18, 1955, Carmichael was formally elected Coordinator, bylaws were accepted and Birmingham-Southern College was chosen as the site of the first fair, with Professor W. R. Smithey as Chairman of Local Arrangements. Grand Prize winners in the first annual fair held on April 22-23, 1955, were Kay Cowan of Bessemer High School and Robert Scott of Tuscaloosa High School. Kay Cowan won a fourth place award at the National Science Fair.

Financial support for the first fair came from a single private individual who underwrote all of the expenses. Instrumental in assuring the continued success of the North Central Fair were many other staff members of Howard College, Birmingham-Southern College, the University of Alabama Medical Center, the Southern Research Institute, and high school science teachers in the Birmingham area.

Following the initial plan that the North Central fair would alternate between Birmingham-Southern College and Howard College, the second annual fair was held at the new Howard College campus on April 27-28, 1956, with John A. Southern as local chairman. Over one hundred exhibits were on display and these were placed in various classrooms and laboratories in the then incomplete science building.

The size of the second annual fair warranted a search for larger quarters in succeeding years. Thus, by the generous co-operation of the City Commission and Park Board of the City of Birmingham, the city auditorium was made available to the fair without cost for the third annual fair which was held on April 10-12, 1957. More than two-

hundred exhibits were entered. Financial support for this fair was placed on a patronage basis and was received from both industry and from private individuals.

The fourth annual fair in 1958 was likewise held at the City Auditorium, but in 1959, through the co-operation of the Alabama State Fair Authority, the fifth fair was moved to the State Fair Grounds and was held on the second floor of the Grandstand Building. The 1960 fair was also at the State Fair Grounds but in the Agricultural Building, the most satisfactory exhibit quarters which it has yet had. The Engineers Club of Birmingham became interested in the Regional Science Fair in 1958 and various members of this organization, in particular Belton Cooper and Sabel Baum, were of enormous service. W. J. Wingo of the University of Alabama Medical Center served as coordinator of the North Central Alabama Fair in 1958 and 1959. In the fall of 1959 the Fair Administration was reorganized and Herbert A. McCullough, of Howard College, accepted the position of coordinator.

Northeastern Alabama Regional Science Fair. A delegation from the science departments of Jacksonville State College visited the Mobile Regional Science Fair held at Spring Hill College in 1958. As a result of this, President Houston Cole of the College, by letter of February 19, 1959, requested the State Coordinator of Science Fairs to establish a regional fair with his College as Coordinating Institution.

By action of the Executive Committee of the Alabama Academy of Science meeting at Auburn on March 12, 1959, the Northeastern Regional Science Fair was established. Reuben B. Boozer, of the Biology Department of Jacksonville State College, was appointed Regional Coordinator. Under his direction, an Administrative Council and committees were appointed, consisting primarily of faculty mem-

bers of the Mathematics and Science Divisions of Jacksonville State College. These groups were instrumental in establishing and promoting the Regional Junior Academy and Science Fair.

Thirty-five junior and senior schools were affiliated with the Northeastern Region the first year, with a student membership of eight hundred forty-seven. One hundred seventy-five exhibits were displayed at the first fair, which was held March 25-26, 1960. Of the two finalists sent to the National Science Fair in Indianapolis, Indiana, Oram Lee Burnett, with a "Carbon 14 Counter", placed fourth in the national awards. John M. Cone, with his "Dielectric Pump", won two Armed-Services awards.

Southeastern Alabama Regional Science Fair. The Southeastern Alabama Regional Science Fair was the result of cooperative effort of staff members of the Alabama Polytechnic Institute of Auburn, Huntingdon College of Montgomery, and Troy State College of Troy, Alabama. Personnel who cooperated in organizing the region were James A. Fraser, Robert Dietz of Troy, Howard Carr of Auburn, and James H. Barrow of Huntingdon College.

The first Southeastern Alabama Regional Science Fair was held at Huntingdon College, March 16-17, 1956. Joint sponsorship of the fair was assumed by the three educational institutions plus the *Montgomery Advertiser* which agreed, through Mr. R. F. Hudson, Jr., Executive Editor, to underwrite the expenses of the fair. Thirty-eight exhibits were displayed. The winners of this first fair, who were sent to the National Science Fair, were Janilu Jordan, Rawls High School, Andalusia and Clarence Thomas, Sidney Lanier High School, Montgomery.

The Southeastern Alabama Regional Science Fair plan calls for rotation at Huntingdon College, Troy State College, and Auburn University. Thus, the second annual fair was held at Troy State College, April 12-13, 1957. This fair was considerably larger, with some eighty to ninety exhibits and an award banquet attended by one hundred and fifty. In addition to the assistance of the *Montgomery Advertiser*, the Southeastern Regional Fair received financial support from several of the large textile concerns within the region, including the West Point Manufacturing Company. The efforts of this company, which independently sponsored a local fair in 1957 for students in the Shaw-

mut, Alabama-West Point, Georgia area, contributed much to the growth of the Southeastern Alabama Regional Science Fair.

In March, 1958, the annual regional science fair was held at Auburn. Over two hundred exhibits were displayed by more than four hundred students. In 1959, the annual exhibition returned to the campus of Huntingdon College in Montgomery. Due to space restrictions the number of entries were limited to approximately one hundred and fifty. Over six hundred dollars was awarded to participants. Following the 1959 fair, the Southeastern Alabama Regional Science Fair was incorporated with the following serving as Trustees: Howard Carr and D. L. Kilbourn, Auburn University; Dean Charles Owens and James C. Wilkes, Huntingdon College; William Wilks and G. O. Spencer, Troy State College; Mr. Winton Blount, Montgomery, Alabama; Mr. Herman Granberry, Shawmut, Alabama; and Mr. R. F. Hudson, Jr., Montgomery, Alabama.

On March 11-12, the 1960 annual fair was held at Troy State College with one hundred forty-seven exhibits presented by two hundred twenty-eight students. Fifty-seven teachers participated; and registrants came from thirty-five school districts in fifteen counties. Nearly fourteen hundred dollars in awards and trips were presented to thirty-nine different individuals or groups, including two hundred dollar awards to two high schools for science equipment. Also in 1960, this region received the sponsorship of the Chambers of Commerce of many cities in this section, and formal plans were initiated to hold the 1961 exhibition in the Coliseum at Montgomery, Alabama.

ORGANIZATION OF REGIONAL SCIENCE FAIRS

As previously mentioned, the Executive Committee took the initial step at its meeting on December 4, 1954, in organizing regional science fairs under the sponsorship of the Academy. At this meeting, a Science Fair Committee, under the chairmanship of Madison L. Marshall, made the following recommendations:

1. That the state be divided into regions with at least one College in each region;
2. That each region be permitted to affiliate with the National Science Fair; and
3. That a State Science Fair Chairman be appointed to coordinate the work of the regions.

These recommendations were adopted and Marshall was appointed State Chairman. At this meeting, it was also specified that each regional fair was to be associated with responsible persons only,

and that financing was to be on a regional basis at no expense to the Academy. The regional fairs in Alabama operated upon this organizational basis while Marshall and his successor, Arthur B. Beindorff, held the office of State Coordinator.

Following Beindorff's resignation, the Executive Committee, on November 8, 1958, elected Father George O. Twellmeyer as State Coordinator and defined more exactly the Academy's sponsorship of regional fairs. The long resolution adopted (1) included establishing a standing committee on Regional Science Fairs, with the Regional Coordinators as ex officio members and the State Coordinator as chairman.

Since responsibility for each regional fair should be vested in institutions of higher learning within the region, they were designated as coordinating institutions with the responsibility of organizing, financing and operating the regional fairs. This function was to be discharged through a single Regional Coordinator if there was only one such institution in the region or through a regional science fair committee to be made up of representatives of each institution when there were more than one. In the latter case, the committee should designate to the State Coordinator the individual to be named chairman and appointed Regional Coordinator.

Each Science Fair was to be as autonomous as possible and yet conform to the standards of the National Science Fair organization as well as policies of the Alabama Academy of Science. The latter were to be determined and carried out by the State Coordinator and the Committee on Regional Science Fairs, reporting to the Academy's Executive Committee for general approval.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Lucille Lloyd as Executive Secretary of the Mobile Regional Fair and other Science Teacher-Sponsors, a high school student organization, known as the Mobile Regional Science Fair Association, developed. Although not limited in its membership to chapters of the Alabama Junior Academy of Science, this organization was functionally a region of the Junior Academy with associate chapters from junior high schools. This organization proved so effective in creating interest and in promoting activity in the Mobile area that a study was made of providing for regions of the A.J.A.S. throughout the State.

At the annual meeting of the Alabama Academy held at Auburn in March, 1959, the Long Range Planning Committee reported suggested changes in the program of the A.J.A.S. and Regional Science Fair Activities to provide for:

1. Regions of the A.J.A.S. which are co-extensive with those of the Regional Fairs;

2. Regional meetings of the A.J.A.S. at the time of the Regional Fairs;
3. Coordinated programs for regional meetings and science fairs;
4. Associate chapters of the A.J.A.S. from junior high schools with limited participation in regional activities of the A.J.A.S.

The necessary constitutional changes to put this program in effect were adopted by both Senior (2) and Junior (3) Academies at this same meeting.

The three well established annual regional science fairs within the state have enjoyed good to outstanding success. Each of the five regions has become stronger with each fair it has held. The operation of the regional fairs vary to meet the needs of the areas in which they are located. Since the reorganization, all regional fairs operate in conjunction with the corresponding A.J.A.S. region, which is to be commended in that it encourages teacher and student participation in the actual planning and mechanics of the fair and lends considerable continuity to teacher and student interest. The administration of each fair still operates with essentially volunteer, in some cases solicited, help. In one case a newspaper cosponsors the fair and assumes financial responsibility. In another case, a group of daily newspapers combine to assume joint responsibility for the raising of the necessary funds for the operation of the fair. All enjoy excellent cooperation from newspapers in their respective areas.

Each of the regional fairs utilizes the services of distinguished scientists, teachers, and professional people as judges for their competitions. Here again, excellent cooperation has been the rule, since, almost without exception, qualified people are willing to make considerable sacrifices to aid in the execution of these worthy activities.

The Alabama Academy of Science sponsors only the regional fairs. No direct sponsorship of school or local fairs is attempted or contemplated, although the Academy, through its general membership, and through the offices of State Fair Coordinator and Regional Coordinators, stands willing to aid any group in setting up a school or local fair program. No formal line of eliminative competition, except that of individual schools, is maintained by the Academy. Although the increasing number of participants in regional fairs has required at least one of the individual regions to restrict entries in the regional fair, such action has been postponed until the regional fairs are at maximum workable size. Currently, the regional fairs usually have one hundred fifty to three hundred exhibits each year. This number continues to increase, however, and when there are more than three

hundred exhibits or so the fair becomes so unwieldy that a quota system becomes necessary. This problem can perhaps be overcome by means of additional regional fairs which would decrease the entries in existing fairs.

Regional rules governing exhibiting, classification of exhibits, judging criteria, etc., are established by the individual regions, patterned after National Fair rules.

Each of the five regional fairs is financed on an individual, self-supporting basis. Although the Academy is the official sponsor of regional fairs in the state, it is unable to assume any financial responsibility. For this reason the regional fairs, individually and collectively, are investigating their eligibility for qualifying as tax-exempt non-profit organizations. In the case of the Mobile Fair, which operates financially via a trust fund, such a tax-exempt ruling was obtained several years ago from the Bureau of Internal Revenue. The North Central Fair has set up a similar trust fund. The Southeastern Alabama Fair has incorporated and has obtained tax exemption as such.

Experience in Alabama has shown that an individual regional fair requires a budget of six hundred to two thousand dollars per year. The major portion of this amount is required to finance the attendance of two finalists and their chaperones at the National Fair. The expense of this trip varies considerably, depending on the location of the National Fair. An additional sum of one hundred twenty five to two hundred dollars is charged each regional fair by Science Service as an entry fee in the National Fair. Other expenses include such items as printing and mailing costs, awards, certificates, etc. Sources of these funds vary with the regions, as discussed earlier.

As with most other aspects of the regional fairs, awards vary from one fair to another. All give participation certificates to all entrants and award certificates to winners. Two fairs give award medals. Each fair, through the cooperation of the Grolier Society, has received since 1957 a gift set of *The Book of Popular Science* to be awarded at the discretion of the individual fair, with the recommendation that the set go to the best exhibits in the Junior division, which includes grades 7, 8 and 9.

Each year all regional fairs award to one senior high boy and one senior high girl expense-paid trips to compete in the National Science Fair. Thus, in 1955, Alabama was represented at Cleveland by six senior high winners. For three years beginning in 1956, when the fourth regional fair was activated in the state, eight finalists have been sent to the national fairs. In 1959, with five regional fairs, Ala-

bama sent nine finalists. Three of the four fairs also sent the sponsoring science teacher of each winner through 1958. In 1959, two official escorts were sent with the group of finalists from the state, decreasing the total travel expense.

The inter-relationships and the continued coordination between the various high school contests and programs set up and carried out by the Alabama Academy of Science should provide ample opportunity for all scientifically inclined young people to participate and gain recognition for diligent effort and superior work.

CHAPTER IX THE SOUTH'S DEBT TO THE ALABAMA ACADEMY OF SCIENCE

Probably no single event in the history of the Academy has had such recognizable and far-reaching results as the address of President George D. Palmer, Jr., in 1940 (1). His subject was "Scientific Research, the Hope of the South." Two complementary organizations, the Southern Research Institute and the Southern Association of Science and Industry, grew directly from it.

Palmer's timely report described the South's low standing at that time in both basic and applied research. He linked this result with the South's low per-capita income, recommending a variety of projects which might be helpful in overcoming the region's handicaps. His statements received wide publicity and led directly to a new and vigorous movement for the advancement of science in the South.

That was on March 24, 1940, at the banquet session of the Academy's meeting at Birmingham-Southern College. After Palmer's address attracted so much interest, he received an invitation from Benjamin Russell, then president of the Alabama State Chamber of Commerce, "to bring a similar message" to the annual meeting of that organization, on October 10, 1940, at the Tutwiler Hotel in Birmingham. He again elaborated upon the message which he had so effectively delivered at Birmingham-Southern College. Later in the day, during a business meeting of the State Chamber of Commerce, Thomas W. Martin, then president of the Alabama Power Company, arose and said, "Gentlemen, we should follow what Dr. Palmer has so ably presented to us this morning."

The statement in Palmer's speech that so interested Martin was as follows:

"I believe that, as Stewart J. Lloyd, Dean of the School of Chemistry, Metallurgy, and Ceramics at the University of Alabama has said, a group of businessmen in the Birmingham district should get together and build up an industrial scientific research organization, not with the idea of subsidizing research but to make money."

Continuing, Martin stated that he would make available \$25,000 a year, if matched, for five or ten years toward such a scientific laboratory. The newspapers and magazines, especially in Alabama, gave headline publicity to this development, and it met with great approval all over the State.

On October 10, 1940, Benjamin Russell was made chairman of a committee of the Alabama State Chamber of Commerce to study such a proposal. He compiled information on initiation of such a research institute modeled after the Mellon Institute, as elaborated in Palmer's address. In fact, Russell gave practically all his time during the last year of his life to this project. He was intensely interested in this matter. Upon his recommendation, as chairman of the committee, the Alabama State Chamber of Commerce, at its next annual meeting, went on record in favor of going ahead with the project.

After Russell's death, Thomas W. Martin was made chairman of the Alabama State Chamber of Commerce committee to establish a scientific research institute. If it had not been for Martin, the Southern Research Institute, which is now doing so much for the South, would probably never have come into existence. His dynamic personality, his energy, and his perseverance were all required to establish and develop this institution on its present basis.

As Palmer indicated, the seed for Southern Research Institute had been planted some ten years earlier by Stewart J. Lloyd—even though the seed had not grown very well until Palmer added the necessary fertilizer so dramatically. But Palmer alone created the Southern Association of Science and Industry. Even before his presidential address—at a business session earlier that same day, in fact—he suggested that the Academy, at its next annual meeting in Mobile in 1941, sponsor a gathering of leaders from over the South with the purpose of establishing a regional organization of scientists, businessmen, and others, for the stimulation of more interest in science in the South. A motion to this effect was made by J. L. Brakefield and passed. The incoming president, C. M. Farmer, asked Palmer to call such an organizational meeting.

Palmer called the meeting by sending several thousand mimeographed letters to leaders of industry and science in the South, inviting them to meet with the Alabama Academy of Science at Spring Hill College, Mobile, March 20-21, 1941. Many answers were received from businessmen, as well as from scientists, with many suggestions. All were in favor of such an organization. Delegates were appointed from many organizations to be present at the Mobile meeting.

As acting chairman of the steering committee, Palmer opened the Mobile meeting. He was then made the chairman of the steering committee over which he presided, March 20-21, 1941. The proposed agenda of the steering committee was followed. A broad program of general talks was given by leaders in the fields of science, business, and government.

Palmer was elected as the first president of the newly named Southern Association for the Advancement of Science (SAAS) for the organization period March 20-21, 1941, in Mobile. He was then made secretary and treasurer beginning March 22, 1941. George H. Boyd became the new president. Dr. Palmer gave up the position of treasurer the following year, at which time the name of the organization was changed to its present name of the Southern Association of Science and Industry. He has remained as secretary to date.

During the early days, Milton H. Fies of Birmingham and W. F. Rudd of Virginia, in addition to those already named, made especially outstanding contributions to SASI. As secretary of SASI, Palmer handled correspondence, membership, and meeting arrangements until 1945, when these matters were transferred to the office of Senator Lloyd C. Bird. Robert F. Nelson, Richmond, Virginia, was appointed public relations counsel. Subsequently, in 1949, Mr. H. McKinley Conway, Jr. was appointed as director, and a headquarters office was established in Atlanta. Conway served as director from 1949 to 1954 and continued as a consultant until December 31, 1959. On January 1, 1960 the administrative affairs of the Southern Association of Science and Industry were placed in the hands of Georgia State College in Atlanta, under the immediate jurisdiction of Mr. W. R. Knight.
